

DIFFERENTIATED CASE MANAGEMENT



WHAT IS DIFFERENTIATED CASE MANAGEMENT?

- DCM is the process of screening cases for complexity and assigning them to various tracks with tailored judicial processes, case management, and allocation of resources based on the needs of the case in order to:
 - ■Reduce delay ↓
 - Make courts more accessible
 - Improve predictability and certainty in calendar management

KEY ELEMENTS OF DCM

- Criteria to categorize cases
- Development of multiple tracks



- Early case screening & track assignment
- Court control and monitoring of case progress and deadlines
- Judicial leadership
- Policies and procedures
- Coordination with stakeholders

HOW ARE THE TRACKS PROCESSED DIFFERENTLY?

- Judicial assignment
- Frequency of court review
- Collaboration with service providers
- Case management
- Court staffing
- Pre-trial events and scheduling

BENEFITS OF DCM

- Better outcomes for children and families
- More efficient case processing
- More timely case processing
- Better use of judicial resources
- More effective court case management
- Increased public trust and confidence when courts move away from a "one-size-fits-all" approach
- More trauma-informed practice

GUIDING PRINCIPLES EXPECTATIONS

- Children's best interests are served when they are safely in the care of their parents.
- Each parent/relative understands the court process, receives answers to their questions and comprehends what is expected of them.
- High expectations for success are established and all parties are held accountable.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES TIMELINESS

- The Court controls the pace of litigation and creates and maintains expectations that events occur when they are scheduled.
- Court proceedings are scheduled expeditiously and cases move through the system efficiently.



GUIDING PRINCIPLES RESOURCES


- Indicial resources are applied so that each case receives the appropriate level of judicial oversight and intervention.
- Families receive quality, consistent and supportive advocacy from attorneys.
- Each child under the Court's protection receives the full range of resources they need and as early in the process as possible.
- Families receive early and specific referrals for services they need to achieve expedited reunification.
- All resources related to each case are used efficiently.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES STAFF RESPONSIBILITY



- Case management is structured so that the skills of the assigned case managers correlate with the objectives of each track.
- The Court and all stakeholder groups work together to coordinate their approaches to the safety and well-being of children and to achieve timely permanency.
- Reliable data will be sought and made available to evaluate the progress and effectiveness of New Tracks activities.
- An environment of open communication and flexibility will be maintained to productively evaluate and make modifications to the New Tracks pilot.

New Tracks II Dependency Differentiated Case Management - Circuit 13



TRACK I: EXPEDITED REUNIFICATION AND RESOLUTION

- The target timeframe for reaching permanency is 6-12 months.
- Assessment tool and proposed case plan referrals will be filed prior to Arraignment in an effort to make service referrals and complete a case plan expeditiously.
- Case plan will be filed at the Arraignment Hearing
- GM New Tracks Docket for Status Hearings and Judicial Reviews
- The GM is also able to close the case unless contested matters require the judge to do so.

TRACK 2: STANDARD SUPERVISION

- The target timeframe for reaching permanency is 12-18 months.
- Traditional case management
- New Tracks Docket GM or Division
- Judicial Reviews GM

TRACK 3: INTENSIVE SUPERVISION

The target timeframe for achieving permanency is 18-22 months



- Cases require intensive judicial oversight
- New Tracks Docket Division
- Judicial Reviews GM or Division

TRACK 4: EXPEDITED TPR

- The target timeframe for achieving permanency is 18 months.
- Cases are expected to have factors that indicate a need to immediately pursue termination of parental rights.
- New Tracks Docket, Active Litigation Division
- Judicial Reviews GM

PERFORMANCE MEASURES

- Performance Measures to be Collected One Year after Pilot Starts
- Performance Measures include Quantitative and Qualitative Methods
- Quantitative Time to Permanency (Days from Child Removal to Permanency Achievement)
- Quantitative Time to Case Closure (Days from Start to End of Case)
- Quantitative Percentage of Cases on each Track
 Completed within Time Frame Established for each Track
- Quantitative reported as Median Number of Days rather than Average to Avoid Outliers

- Qualitative Semi-structured Interview of a Representative of each Agency involved in New Tracks to Provide Opinions on Pilot – Content Analysis of Responses
- Workflow Charts of Traditional vs. New Tracks Dependency Case Processing
- Summary of Analysis Results to Add to Body of Knowledge regarding DCM in Dependency
- Independent External Evaluation

4. Child is verified to be a CSEC victim, or has FBI or Homeland Security involvement	
Section 3: Parental Factors	✓
1. Parent has serious and complex medical issues that affect their ability to parent	
2. Prior termination as to other children	
3. Pending court actions that could impact permanency	

TRACK 4: Expedited TPR

Expedited TPR	✓
1. Incarcerated parent(s) is a violent career criminal, habitual violent offender, or sexual predator	
2. Parent(s) has engaged in egregious conduct or failed to prevent egregious conduct as defined in Ch. 39	
3. Parent(s) have subjected their child, or another child, to aggravated child abuse, sexual battery, sexual abuse or chronic child abuse	
4. Parent(s) have a prior involuntary TPR	
5. The children have been removed 3 or more times from the parent(s) care	
6. Parents(s) have engaged in chronic substance abuse and refused or failed to complete treatment within the prior 3 years.	
7. Other:	
Consult with Attorney General within 2 business days of CTS if expedited TPR will be explored	

- If mental health, substance use and/or domestic violence factors are actively occurring, significant, severe, and suggest a need for more intensive judicial oversight, a recommendation for Track 3: Intensive Supervision or Drug Court may be made. Justification must be included on the cover page.
- Further discussion regarding track recommendation may be needed if parties cannot come to an agreement.
